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Marshal's Minute-State Fire Marshal James A. Rivera



The Small Equipment Grant Application Period remains open until December 15, 2023, and we know many departments who are wanting to apply have questions. We will be hosting three Q&A sessions to help answer questions regarding our Small Equipment Grant Program application. Our CFO will be available for fiscal questions, Grant Coordinator for general questions, Les Albert for tier and other application questions, and our NFIRS staff available for compliance questions. Thanksgiving is the leading day for home fires involving cooking equipment, with four times the average number occurring. Ranges and cook-tops account for almost three out of every five home fires reported involving cooking, with ovens accounting for 13% of those fires. Cooking causes half (49%) of all reported home fires and more than two of every five (42%) home fire injuries, and it is the second leading cause of home fire deaths (20%).

According to the U.S. Fire Administration (USFA), each year from 2017 to 2019, an estimated average of 2,300 residential building fires were reported to fire departments in the U.S. on Thanksgiving Day. These fires caused an estimated annual average of 5 deaths, 25 injuries and \$26 million in property loss. U.S. fire departments respond to an average of 166,100 home fires per year involving cooking equipment.

Before you start to cook your holiday meals, make sure your cooking equipment is in working order and all ovens and cook tops are clean. Create a "Kid Free Zone" of at least three feet around the stove or anywhere you are preparing hot food or drinks. Never leave food that you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling unattended! If you leave the kitchen, even for a short amount of time, turn off the stove.

Frying a Turkey has become more popular in recent years.

- Make sure to not overfill oil in the fryer. Fill the pot you plan to use to fry the turkey with water and place the turkey in. This will help to determine how much oil is needed without causing oil to spill out when you are ready to fry, which could lead to a fire.
- Use the turkey fryer outdoors ONLY!
- Make sure the turkey is completely thawed and dry before frying.
- Use long cooking gloves that protect hands and arms when you handle the pot!

Small Equipment Grant



The Office of the State Fire Marshal (OSFM) announces the application period is open for the Small Equipment Grant Program. The OSFM will award \$4 million to eligible fire departments and ambulance services for the purchase of small firefighting and ambulance equipment. All interested departments should send an application to OSFM electronically or postmarked no later than December 15, 2023.

The Small Equipment Grant Program was established to provide grants of up to \$26,000 to eligible departments. A total of \$1.5 million was awarded to 64 fire departments/districts and EMS providers across the state in March.

This program is an innovative approach to a problem that has long caused difficulties for the fire departments and not-for-profit ambulance services in Illinois, particularly those that have hardships in generating the necessary revenue for small equipment. The grants allow eligible applicants the opportunity to purchase small tools and equipment that they may otherwise not be able to purchase. In addition to firefighting personal protective equipment (PPE), applicants can also apply for personal infection control items such as masks, gowns, and gloves this application cycle. Most Illinois fire departments, fire protection districts, and township fire departments are eligible to apply. In addition, standalone, not-for-profit ambulance service providers are eligible to apply.

All applicants are required to have participated in the National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS) for a minimum of two years prior to applying. The OSFM will require departments to be current from September 2021 through August 2023 for this grant period.

Fire Prevention Week



The OSFM joined organizations and fire departments across the state and nation and to celebrate the 101st anniversary of Fire Prevention Week, October 8-14. Thanks to Governor JB Pritzker for issuing a proclamation to honor the week. This year's theme, "Cooking safety starts with YOU! Pay attention to fire prevention," focuses on cooking safety to help educate the public about simple but important steps they can take to help reduce the risk of fire when cooking at home, keeping themselves and those around them safe.

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), cooking is the leading cause of home fires, with nearly half (49 percent) of all home fires involving cooking equipment; cooking is also the leading cause of home fire injuries. Unattended cooking is the leading cause of home cooking fires and related deaths. In addition, NFPA data shows that cooking is the only major cause of fire that resulted in more fires and fire deaths in 2014-2018 than in 1980-1984.

Fire prevention doesn't stop after the week is over, it is a year-round project. As we enter the holiday season and kitchen become busy, this messaging remains very important.

Winchester High School Visit



World Mental Health Day



October 10th is World Mental Health Day. The overall objective of World Mental Health Day is to raise awareness of mental health issues around the world and to mobilize efforts in support of mental health.

The day provides an opportunity for all stakeholders working on mental health issues to talk about their work, and what more needs to be done to make mental health care a reality for people worldwide.

Statistics show 1 in 4 people suffer from some form of mental illness in any given year. Firefighters are three times more likely to die from suicide than in the line of duty. According to the Firefighter Behavioral Health Alliance, 105 firefighters took their own lives in the United States in 2014. The US Firefighters Association (USFA reports that about 10 percent of firefighters may be abusing illicit substances and that alcohol abuse among this population is more than twice the rates seen in the general public.) Post-traumatic stress disorder, depression, and suicidal thoughts and behaviors among first responders are also common and believed to be triggered or worsened by repeat exposure to trauma, including physical abuse and death among the people they serve, loss of people close to them, and life-threatening situations.




SAVE THE DATE:

NEW COURSE OFFERINGS:



Thanksgiving Cooking Safety



- Stay in the kitchen when you are cooking on the stovetop so you can keep an eye on the food.
- Stay in the home when cooking your turkey and check on it frequently.
- Keep children away from the stove. The stove will be hot and kids should stay 3 feet away.
- Make sure kids stay away from hot food and liquids.
 The steam or splash from vegetables, gravy or coffee could cause serious burns.
- Keep the floor clear so you don't trip over kids, toys, pocketbooks or bags.
- Keep knives out of the reach of children.
- Be sure electric cords from an electric knife, coffee maker, plate warmer or mixer are not dangling off the counter within easy reach of a child.
- Keep matches and utility lighters out of the reach of children — up high in a locked cabinet.
- Never leave children alone in room with a lit candle.
- Make sure your smoke alarms are working. Test them by pushing the test button.



Have activities that keep kids out of the kitchen during this busy time. Games, puzzles or books can keep them busy. Kids can get involved in Thanksgiving preparations with recipes that can be done outside the kitchen.





Thanksgiving Cooking Safety



Turkey Fryer Fire Safety

Frying food puts you at the greatest risk of cooking fires. Before you fry a turkey, review these tips to keep you and your loved ones safe.



Turkey fryers can tip over easily, spilling hot cooking oil over a large area. Make sure your turkey fryer is on a sturdy, level surface and do not move it once it is in use.



Make sure it is at least 10 feet from your home and not under roof eaves.



An overfilled cooking pot will cause cooking oil to spill when the turkey is put in.

Test the amount of oil you need by filling your fryer with water. Place the turkey in the pot making sure the water doesn't get too close to the top. Measure the water and use that as a guide for filling the pot with oil.



A partially frozen turkey will cause cooking oil to splatter when you put it in the cooking pot.

Make sure your turkey is fully thawed without frost on it before you fry it.



Without thermostat controls, deep fryers can overheat oil to the point of starting a fire.

If your turkey fryer does not have a thermostat, use a kitchen thermometer that attaches to the side of the pot. This will help you monitor the temperature of the oil.



The sides of the cooking pot, lid and pot handles can get dangerously hot.

Always use protective oven mitts. Keep children and pets at least 3 feet from the turkey fryer.



Consider using an electric or air fryer.

CO Safety



Checklist

Carbon Monoxide Car Safety

Carbon monoxide (CO) accounts for about **20,000 ER visits each year**, making it a leading cause of poisonings in the United States. Even if CO levels are not high enough to be fatal, they can result in serious, long-term illness.

CO is an **odorless, colorless, and tasteless gas** that produced any time you burn fuel in cars or trucks, small engines, stoves, lanterns, grills, fireplaces, gas ranges, or furnaces.

Many CO poisonings occur in **cars, garages, and even outside**. Use this checklist to eliminate the risk of CO poisoning to you and your loved ones.

In Your Car

CO leaks in your car can be extremely dangerous since your car is a small, enclosed space. Remember to...

- Get regular maintenace to checkyour car's exhaust and emission systems
- Have a mechanic check your car's exhuast system after a fender bender
- Clear any snow near your exhaust in the snowy winter
- ☐ Get any holes in your car's body repaired
- ☐Close your trunk before driving



In Your Garage

Home garages can be dangerous since a car's exhaust fuels are released in an indoor space. When in your garage...

- Open your garage door before starting your car
- Don't leave your running car in the garage, even for a few minutes
- Install a carbon monoxide detector in your garage
- Remove your car from your garage to warm it up



Outside

Unfortunately, you're never safe from CO, even outside. When you're outside, remember to...

- ☐ Turn your car off at a tailgate
- Stay upwind of all running cars
- ☐ Keep a distance of more than 6 feet away from any running vehicle






